March 8 - A Florida Family Homesteader During Times of Social, Racial, and Political Unrest

Family lineage involves a group of people descended from a

common ancestor. An ascending lineage begins with a younger person and traces ancestors upward to parents, grand-



parents, and as high as one can climb the family tree. A descending lineage begins with a known elder ancestor and traces the family tree downward to the youngest known descendant. This is important for heritage societies, such as the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution. They require proof of direct lineage for membership.

Come be inspired by a story about Gale Pinkston's paternal, second-great-grandfather. It illustrates the kinship-proving process not only for heritage societies but sparks the fascination underlying all valid family histories.

April 12 - Genealogical Traps and Escapes Wisdom Unleashed: Our Panelists' Expertise Shines

If you haven't encountered pitfalls, you haven't done much genealogy, have you? Our local panel has stories to share ranging from hiccups to nightmares.

This is an interactive session about would-be disasters and lessons learned to overcome problems in that quest for the certain family tree. Bring your puzzles, and we will draw on these experiences to eke out those elusive answers.

May 10 - A Grave Story

Peter DuFresne will share his expertise on the history of gravestones and discuss what can be found when you look inside the grave rather than just at the stone itself.





June 12 - Journey Through Family Search.org

Our June program will feature Steven Danderson, volunteer and expert extraordinaire on the topic of the intricacies and features of LDS Family Search website. Steven also serves as the technical specialist for the Lakeland LDS stake (ward). He will describe the resources available to the public at the Lakeland LDS Family Search center including 15 subscription based genealogical sites and organizations. For those more digital minded, he will talk about the Android and Apple apps available.

July 12 -DAR Dimensions: Legacy, Yes. Research Too!

Our July program will feature past IPGS historian Gayle Londeree, who is registrar of the Lakeland Chapter of The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. She will enlighten us as to the membership requirements of the DAR and describe some of the resources available. These include the Genealogical Research System (GRS), a genealogical database available to the general public.

Gayle also serves as a volunteer genealogist with the Florida organization of DAR. How does qualifying work? What does it cost? What are member benefits? We look forward to knowing more about this legacy genealogical organization.
